New Edition of Phineas' Journal To Be Printed Soon

A new expanded edition of Phineas Wolcott Cook's original journal will soon be printed. The 400-page legacy book, adds information and context to Phineas' original journal. The recently discovered Goshen portion of his journal will be included. Information from his children and about his children will also be in the book.

This fall, before the book is printed, the organization will be carrying out a survey to find how many people might want to purchase a copy of the book. Glen McMillan will talk about the new order form and explain how family members an order materials.

Janet Porter and her sister Yvonne Peterson will talk about the new expanded edition of the Phineas Wolcott Cook Journal. The book will be printed next year, but excerpts will be shown at the Cook O Rama, so family members will have a chance to see it and make plans to purchase the book.

Phineas Wolcott Cook Journal Images With Transcriptions Coming to Website

Images from Phineas Wolcott Cook's 230-page journal's from 1843 to 1868 soon be posted to the family website with text posted side by side for easier study.

This project divides the journal into four sections: Section 1 includes 55 pages of work records; Section 2 "Life and History" includes 107 pages.

Section 3 includes 52 pages of letters; and Section 4 includes 16 pages of work records. Section 2 has been previously published but the other 123 pages have not been published.

Sections 1 and 4 describe Phineas' occupation. For example, he earned 12 ½ cents per hour in 1843 (section 4 page 9) and worked 12-hour days. Wheat, flour, and beef were major food purchases.


He was involved in several trades: 1) building and operating grist mills and sawmills, 2) surveying land, 3) selling newspaper subscriptions, 4) building buildings, and 5) building wagons including a Brigham Young wagon.

Phineas' Table of Logs in Section 4 page 6 and "Falling Bodies" in Section 4, page 1 which show how practical he was. The table of logs lets him determine how many logs he needs for a construction project and the falling bodies allows him to easily determine the depth of a well.

The expense records show the prices he paid for goods which generally fall into three groups: 1) prior to heading to Utah in 1848, 2) Utah through 1851 and 3) Utah after 1851.

Section 3 is a series of letters which give some insights to Phineas' understanding of his faith.


As a whole, the journal shows that making records was important

to Phineas. Its study is fascinating and was a direct motivation leading to our Phineas Wolcott Cook Extended Family Temple Work project.

This project to post Phineas' journal side by side with the transcription is both additional to and complementary of the new edition of the journal which will be published in October by the Cook Family Organization.

Cook Organization Begins Extended Family Research, Temple Work Project

In an effort to increase family participation in Cook family history, a new project has been developed which will assist family members in doing basic geneology research as well as temple work for ancestors of Phineas Wolcott Cook and his wives.

Brent Hale, director of the project for the PW Cook Family Organization, has identified thousands of names of Phineas' ancestors and his wives' ancestors and their dependents who need more documentation and whose temple work has not yet been done. He found these ancestors while doing some personal research into the life expectancy of Cook descendants which lead him to looking into Phineas' ancestors back to Henry Cooke, the first ancestor to arrive in America. It was in the course of this research he identified those ancestors who need more research done and whose temple work still needs to be finished.

He has created a database of the names of those ancestors who need more research done. A web-based signup for those interesting in helping with this research and temple work is being created. This sign up will soon be available on social media posts, the website or future email messages with instructions to use it. When you sign up, you will be given a name to research and their FamilySearch ID.

Brent has suggested several recommended steps to help family members in their use of this sign up

First, check the FamilySearch "View My Relationship" link to make sure that the person is a relative.

Then use sources to document that each person is a real person. We do not recommend doing temple work for persons who have no source documentation. Multiple sources will improve the accuracy of the work and should be linked when possible.

Each person should be documented with: name, gender, and a birth, marriage or death vital statistic that indicates a date and a location.

Brent also recommends using sources to link children to their parents, and spouses. Also, he says it would be good to check for duplicate records.

Finally, after all the information is reasonably documented for each individual and family, then family members should check to be sure the LDS temple work has not already been done for them.

Brent explained that some of the names on the online database already have documentaion that appears to be accurate. Others have little documentation or may be



inaccurately linked to children or spouses. Some duplicate records still need to be merged.

While this is a family-led project, it should be noted that since Family Search is a "live" database, other researchers not in our direct family may also be working some of the names.

A training class has been prepared for family members who would like to help with this research. It will especially help those who would like to assist in completing the LDS temple work for our extended family.

many journals of his children will add valuable information for the periods of Phineas' life after his formal journal ended in 1857. For the 40 remaining years of his life, his record is compiled from a variety of other sources, including his children's journals as

well as the recently discovered minutes kept for the Goshen Ward.

This expanded edition contains information about Phineas' years in Goshen. There is also information about the years he spent in Bear Lake, Swan Creek, Sanpete County, Logan, Hams Fork, Wyoming and

Star Valley, Wyoming.

Much of the information we know about his life during these later years was found in the journals many of his children kept.

Janet Porter, family genealogist has spent many years gathering information, editing and expanding Phineas' Journal. The new edition contains much information not found in earlier editions, including the entire Goshen Journal, which was only discovered in the Church History library in the last decade.

The P. W. Cook Family Organization will eventually release the book digitally on the the website in the future, but the date of that has not yet been released, and may not occur for several years.

Journey to Join the Saints

During the winter of 1845, I was finishing off a house, which was an addition to the main house, until the month of December when an Elder by the name of Edward Willard was sent to me to tell me the time had come for all the Saints to gather, for the church was going to move to Vancouver's Island or someplace in the far west. It was not known yet where, but we were required to do as Abraham did, to go to a land that should yet be shown to us. I told Mother the word I had received, but she did not like it much. I said the Lord had called me to save my father's house and it was for her as much as any.

She said that if she was never saved until I did it, she should be damned to all eternity. I talked much to her about my faith and the hope that was before me, but she did not believe me. She said she had one consolation and it was I had not any means that I could command to go with and she guessed I would have my match to get away. I told her the God that I served was rich, for the earth was his, and the fullness thereof and I had no fears but what I should get away. Inasmuch as I [had] done the best I could, the Lord was bound to open the way for me and he surely would do it.

"Yes!" said she, "the God that does such things is made of silver and gold."

Vancouver Island

While the Saints generally accepted the idea that their eventual destination would be somewhere in the Rocky Mountains, in 1845 they had no idea exactly where it would be. Vancouver's Island, then held by the British, was one of the possibilities suggested (Leonard J. Arrington, Brigham Young, American Moses, Vintage Books, New York 1985, p. 123). Part of Vancouver's attraction was that it would be out of the country and away from present persecution. The Saints in England liked the idea of an American Zion under the British flag.

"The November 28, 1846, issue of the Millennial Star carried a petition to Queen Victoria and the members of the British Parliament for a grant of land and financial assistance to transport 20,000 British settlers to 'Vancouver's Island.' But the petition was apparently never directly acted upon, and in January 1849 a royal charter turned Vancouver Island over to the Hudson Bay Company." (Herbert Howe Bancroft, History of Utah, San Francisco, 1889, p. 238, reprinted in Robert J. McCue, "The Saints on Vancouver's Island," The Ensign, April 1976).

Goshen Journal: The Move to Sandtown

Part 15,


Summer of 1859 was a difficult time for the Goshen saints. Having been forced out of their homes two successive years as snow and ice melted and water seeped into their homes, they had located a spot on high ground almost two miles southwest and began the work of rebuilding and relocating. As they were also planting crops and managing their herds, it was a stressful time for all. And having recently emerged from a tempestuous experience with Chauncey Webb cutting their hay to sell, they were already weary.

Contention began to disrupt their meetings and several families left Goshen. Phineas wrote to Bishop Edward Hunter about the problem, and was told there must not be contention in Priesthood Meetings. Phineas did his best to ease the tension. He wrote:

“Bishop P. W. Cook said that he should report to their respective Quorums those turbulent members and would take it as a favor for them to leave this place and the time would come when they would have to humble themselves. The Bishop showed the necessity of every man having the light within him under all circumstances. Men are controlled by two principles, good and evil. [We must ask and seek] for the spirit of revelation to guide us under all circumstances. Showed the necessity of prayer and that regular.”

On August 7, Bishop Cook arose and said he had been edified as a general thing with the spirit of the Seventies. He had his trials. He said

“Men came on this earth to be tried and I feel thankful that I am accounted worthy. It is the duty of every man to follow his file leader and keep his covenants, live his religion and magnify his calling.

“It seems that some of you have been tried with me or with my acts. It was taught me years ago that the people would be tried from time to time by the servants of God. I have only done what I considered to be my duty. I alone am responsible for the record of this people and the acts of them. If they will take my counsel they are not accountable for my acts. For I am accountable to them who have placed me here.”

On August 14 he exhorted the

people:

“Know for a surety that [you] are the friend of God, and if there are any who do not know, or think you are not the friends of God, try to prove yourselves faithful to his servants so that through them you may obtain favor in his sight or make yourselves friends on righteous principles.”

After doing everything he knew how to stop it, the bickering continued. So Phineas stopped holding meetings until the end of the year. After months of conflict with Brother Webb and others, Phineas did not back away from what he considered his responsibility. To him Priesthood authority implied obedience, and there was no compromise. He told the saints,

“Some were in too great hurry to get rich, had to go to cutting hay, picking currants, etc. on Sunday because they had no time in the week. Heard there was some said that they should leave unless there is an alteration. There will be an alteration. The Priesthood will have to keep their covenants.”
