REVIEW OF THE LIFE OF CATHERINE MCCLEVE COOK RUSSELL



Catherine McCleve Cook Russell

Catherine McCleve was born September 17, 1836 in Crawfordsburn, Down County, Ireland, and was the second child born of these parents. When she was fourteen, she and her sisters Sarah, Margaret, and Mary Jane were baptized in the Irish Sea after dark on August 26, 1850.

After accepting the Gospel, the McCleve family had a strong desire to come to America. Although the father had a good job, the cost of moving the entire family to America at once was impossible for him to handle. For this reason, the Elders advised them to send their two oldest daughters, Sarah and Catherine, on ahead. The rest of the family were to remain in Ireland until sufficient means could be saved to finance the trip for them.

Consequently, Catherine, aged eighteen, and her sister Sarah, aged twenty, left Ireland on March 28, 1853, and set sail for America from Liverpool, England. They came to Utah with Captain John Brown's company. Both girls married before the year was out-- Catherine to Phineas Wolcott Cook on December 18, 1853 in the Endowment House in Salt Lake City, and Sarah to John Young on October 3, 1853.

The day that Catherine married Phineas Wolcott Cook, he also married Amanda Savage. Because Amanda was six weeks older than Catherine, she became the second wife and Catherine the third. Phineas already had his first wife, Ann Eliza Howland, who had several children. Before Phineas took these wives, President Young had advised him to go into polygamy. He prayed sincerely over the matter until the Lord revealed the principle to him. On April 21, 1855, in Salt Lake City, Catherine's first child, a son, was born in a house that was about a block east of the Eagle Gate. He was named Joseph Wolcott Cook.

When Catherine and Sarah left their loved ones in Ireland in 1853, it was with the understanding that the rest of the family would follow as soon as they had the money to do so. After three long years, they received word that their parents and brothers and sisters were coming to America. How happy Catherine and Sarah were! By this time, Catherine had her son Joseph and Sarah had two young children, Lydia and John McCleve Young. They looked forward with great anticipation to seeing their family, who in turn were very anxious to see them and their husbands as well as the new grandchildren.

CATHERINE McCLEVE COOK RUSSELL, CONT.

The family was with the Second Handcart Company. When the companies were within two days' travel of their destination, an emergency arose for the McCleves threatening the loss of all their worldly possessions as their handcart hung precariously on the edge of an embankment. The father, exerting every ounce of strength remaining in a body emaciated and weakened with the weeks of struggle pulling the handcart across the plains, tried too hard. He saved the cart and its contents, but he injured himself internally. After suffering severely for a few hours, he passed away on September 24, 1856.

On September 26, when the word came that the First and Second Handcart Companies were nearing the city, many people eagerly went to meet them. Among them were Catherine and Sarah. What a tremendous sorrow and disappointment it was to these girls when they found that two days previously their father had succumbed to the hardships of the journey and had been buried in a lonely grave near Bear River.

When Catherine's son Joseph Wolcott was about two years old, her husband with his family journeyed south. They settled in Payson, and it was while they were living here that Catherine procured a divorce from her husband. He moved on to Goshen where he was a great help in building up the settlement and presiding in the Church. Catherine and her son stayed in Payson with her family. Later, she and Joseph went to Parowan to visit her sister Mary Jane who had married Dr. Priddy Meeks. They were among the early settlers in that country. At the end of this short stay, she returned to Utah County with a man who was bringing to Salt Lake City the bones of President George A. Smith's son who had been killed by the Indians. Upon their return, Joseph went with his brother to his father's home where he stayed for six or eight months.

On November 11, 1862, Catherine married a man by the name of David Dudley Russell. In the spring of 1863, as she traveled with her husband to Salt Lake she stopped at the Cook residence and picked up her son Joseph and took him with her. On this trip, Catherine asked Joseph to call her husband "Father." Joseph was not too fond of the idea, but he consented and did so until his mother's death.

Russell did not own a home, so the family lived in rented houses in Payson and Salem (then called Pond Town). He and Joseph carried willows in their arms to make a willow fence around Catherine's garden.

The winter of 1864-65 was a hard one. Russell with some friends and his brothers moved to settle on the Sevier River at Salina. Soon after they arrived at Moroni, in Sanpete County, the Black Hawk War broke out. The Indians came down from Salina Canyon and drove off nearly all of the cattle and killed several men. Early one morning in April, Russell and Joseph arose very early to find a team of oxen that had been turned out to graze during the night. They had just returned home for breakfast when Catherine, who was going up the steps of their dugout or home, heard a man from across the street call out, "Into the houses, women and children; the Indians are onto us!" She looked, and there they came, a dozen or more of them. Some were on horses, but most of them were on foot. Moments later a shot rang out, and they knew that the shepherd who had passed only a few minutes earlier with the sheep had been killed.

These were frightening days for Catherine and her family. In the different Indian raids that took place at this time, stock was driven away by the Indians, men were killed, and in some instances people disappeared and were never seen again.

They arrived in Salina in June, 1865. Shortly after this, teams came from the northern settlements to move the people back closer to the center of the Church. The Russells stopped in Gunnison until his brother Henry came and took them back to Payson where they lived for the next two years. Here Catherine's husband and son worked. They worked in the harvest fields and made adobes. Joseph worked and earned enough potatoes to last the family during the winter.

In 1868, Russell went to Heneferville to work and took Joseph with him. He rented a farm, and after the crops were in, they went back to Payson for Catherine and her three other children--Hannah Jane, David Riley, and Margaret. Catherine had lost a child Sarah Catherine in the fall of 1867.

During the summer and fall, Russell frequently had business in Echo City. He often came home under the influence of liquor. This, of course, hurt Catherine very much. In November she became very ill. Joseph recorded in his autobiography that, "She was out of her head and seemed (as I look back on it now) to have an awful fever, which threw her into a state of delirium." There were no doctors in the area.

Russell made preparations to move her south. He fixed up a bed in a covered wagon and put Catherine and the children and the few things that could be hauled into it and started for Salt Lake City. They were two days and nights on the way. The weather was extremely cold. They stopped in Salt Lake for a day or so with Catherine's sister Sarah Young. Then, with the same outfit, they started south again. At American Fork, they stopped for a day or two with friends. While there, Catherine spoke her last conscious words. Her son Joseph was at her bedside, and she said to him, "Joseph, my son, would you be a good boy and take care of my children?" Joseph quickly promised her that he would.

A day or two later, Russell crowded Catherine and her children in the same rig and headed south again. They reached Spanish Fork about dark. Catherine died at the home of her sister Isabell Mott that evening December 19, 1869. She left three living children besides Joseph. The youngest was Margaret who was approximately sixteen months old.

Joseph returned years later and searched in vain for his mother's grave or a record of it.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE COOK FAMILY ORGANIZATION

Since Phineas Wolcott Cook had four wives, it is proposed that our Governing Board of Directors consist of four members--one representative from each branch of the family. Our Central Committee appointed an acting Governing Board on January 22, 1972 to function until sustained or replaced by the individual families at our coming reunion.

Those appointed on January 22, 1972 as temporary representatives are:

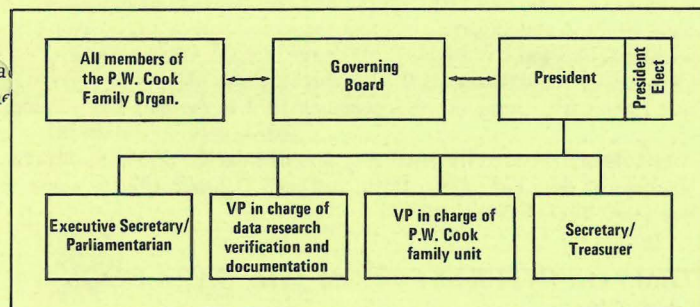

In order to make your feelings known, give suggestions, etc. please communicate with your family representative.

For the present, at least, Dean Cook, president of our family organization, will function as chairman of the board. He will be called upon to vote in case of a tie of the members of the governing board.

Once again, the basic objectives of this organization are: (1) to research and document the genealogy of Phineas Wolcott Cook (a prerequisite to Temple work), and (2) to encourage solidarity of his descendants. Two vice presidents have been appointed to these specific assignments. They are Alton D. Cook of Brigham City, Utah, and Gene A. Cook of Salt Lake City, Utah. Nan Cook is the secretary/treasurer. The positions of president-elect and executive secretary/parliamentarian are presently vacant.

WILFORD ULRICK FLUCKIGER

Wilford Ulrich Fluckiger was born at Bedford, Wyoming on June 17, 1903. He was the third son of Jacob Andrew Fluckiger and Barbara Baumgartner. He married Clella Cook September 9, 1925 in the Salt Lake Temple. He died November 9, 1971 in Salt Lake City.

He was a long time resident of Star Valley, Wyoming, and was owner and operator of the Valley Furniture Company for many years. After moving to Salt Lake about 15 years ago, he became a real estate broker. He owned and operated the U.S. Realty Company.

Wilford was always active in the L.D.S. Church and held many leadership positions including Sunday School superintendent, president of the Seventies quorum, and High Priest group leader.

Besides raising a large family of their own, Wilford and Clella added three adopted children to their group and opened their home to many foster children.

The last 18 months of his life were spent in the mission field in the Australia East mission. One of the highlights of the mission was the organizing of a Temple excursion, the undertaking of projects to finance it, and activating people to participate. Through the efforts of Wilford and Clella, 31 people made the trip from northern Australia to New Zealand at that time, and others who were unable to leave their work then are still sending in reports that they have now completed the trip, also.

According to the assistant to the mission president, Wilford and Clella also converted and baptized during their 18 month stay more people than are converted and baptized by 80% of the two-year missionaries.

Wilford is survived by his widow, 14 sons and daughters, 60 grandchildren, and 3 great grandchildren. Interment was in the Afton, Wyoming cemetery.

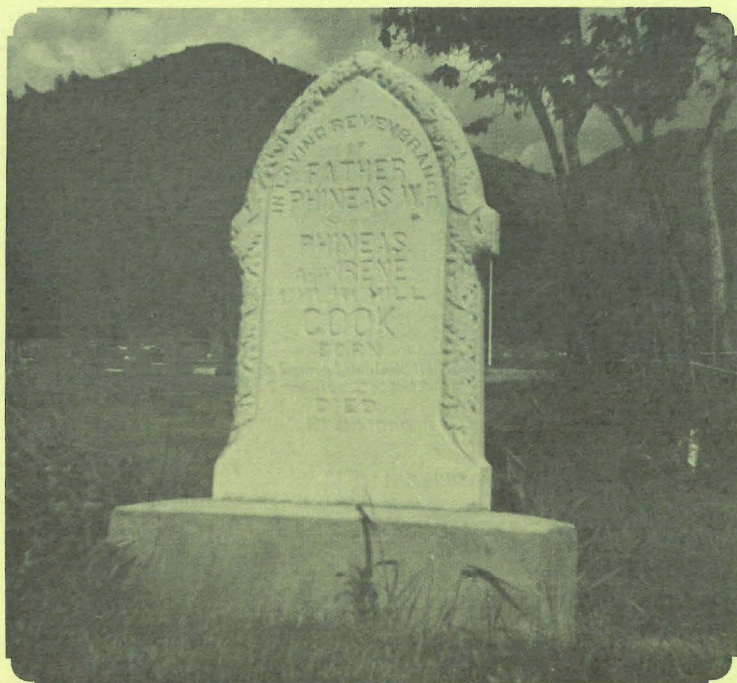
